Scope: This special edition invites manuscripts that evaluate how environmental factors influence development during critical windows, such as the perigestational period, lactation, and adolescence, and how these factors continue to shape the risk of developing chronic non-communicable diseases. Studies may explore the impact of the environment on various physiological systems, including the central nervous, cardiovascular, respiratory, immune, reproductive, digestive, skeletal, and urinary systems, among others. The edition focuses on, but is not limited to, environmental factors such as maternal and paternal nutrition, illness, drugs consumption, infections, physical activity, stress, mental health, behavioral and lifestyle factors, climate change, pollutants, and natural disasters.

We would like to **invite you to submit a paper (mainly research articles, reviews also will be accepted in a restricted number)** to this Special Issue. Manuscripts may be **submitted until 31 October 2025**.
